

VENUE

Botanic Gardens, Belfast (between Queen's University and Ulster Museum). Access to the show for staging purposes is via gates at Botanic Avenue.

On Saturday 13 September Botanic Gardens must be cleared of exhibitors' vehicles by 9.30am.

Exhibitors can continue to stage exhibits up to 10.30am on Saturday but vehicular access to Botanic Gardens will not be permitted after 9.30am and any vehicles already on site must be removed by 9.30am.

Cars will not be permitted access to Botanic Gardens on Sunday 14 September until after the event closes and stewards on site have cleared the public from the event area. Please note that there can be a delay in gates opening until it has been deemed safe to permit vehicular access.

CITY OF BELFAST AUTUMN FLOWER SHOW

RULES

The Rules of the various Societies shall apply, e.g. The Rose Society of Northern Ireland, etc. Rules and Regulations of specialist Societies — details of such societies' special conditions are given at the beginning of each set of relevant classes.

DEFINITIONS

The words 'kind', 'cultivar' and 'variety' are used in this schedule in the following sense: Sweet Peas, Roses, Carnations are distinct 'kinds' of flowers. 'W B Yeats', 'Sweet Magic' and 'Remember Me' are distinct 'varieties' (cultivars) of roses.

REGULATIONS

- 1. All classes including 'confined' and 'novice' classes are open to the general public, unless the wording of a particular class specifies otherwise.
- 2. Attention to Horticultural Exhibits during the show, watering of exhibits should be carried out between 11.30am and 12.30pm on Sunday 14 September if required. No vehicular access will be permitted.
- 3. All exhibits, personal property, etc. shall be at the risk of the exhibitors. The organisers shall not be liable for compensation for loss or damage from any cause whatsoever.
- Exhibitors will not be allowed to place advertising matter of any description on or near their exhibits.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL EXHIBITORS REGISTRATION FORMS AND ENTRY CARDS

Please note that exhibitors entering the City of Belfast Flower Show will be responsible for completing their own entry cards.

- 5. (a) All exhibitors must complete a registration form in order to enter exhibits at the Show.
 - There is a registration form at the back of the schedule or alternatively registration forms are available from the Show Secretary's desk at the Show venue or from the Show Secretary (see address, page 4).
 - (b)The signing of a registration form by an exhibitor shall imply that he/she agrees to observe and conform to all the rules and regulations in connection with the Show.

6. (a) Completed registration forms with entry fees, including members of the W.I., to be handed in at the Show Secretary's desk:

Friday 12 September between 12noon - 8pm

(Floral Art: 6pm - 8.00pm).

Saturday 13 September between 8am - 10.30am (Honey).

- (b) W.I. members entering the Team Class must complete a registration form under the name of the institute. W.I. members entering any other class must complete a registration form, under their own name and address etc.
- 7. When a registration form and the correct entry fee have been handed in, the exhibitor will be given an exhibitor's number and the correct number of entry cards.

The exhibitor will be responsible for filling in his/her entry cards before placing them at his/her exhibits.

8. (a) Entry Fees: 1 - 20 entries, £1 each; each additional entry free.

Exceptions; W.I. Team Entry - £2

Allotment Class - £2

Children's Classes, Children and Youth Classes (Honey), Parks Classes, School's Class and Community Garden Class are exempt from entry fees. (b) Cheques to be made payable to Belfast City Council. Entry fees payable at the Show Secretary's desk during staging times (see rule 10)

An exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in any class unless otherwise stated.

STAGING

10.	Exhibitors can stage their exhibits in the marquee during the following times:
	□ Friday 12 September, 12noon - 8pm, (Floral Art: 6pm – 8.00pm).

Saturday 13 September, 6.30am - 10.30am, (Floral Art: 8am - 10.30am), (Honey, 8am - 10am).

- 11. Entry cards shall be placed face downwards in front of the exhibits prior to judging.
- 12. All exhibits (cut flowers, plants, vegetables etc.) must be the property of the exhibitor and must have been grown by the exhibitor at least two months previous to exhibition. Exceptions to this rule are, W.I & Floral Art classes.
- 13. Except in the W.I. classes two or more persons may not exhibit in the same class from the same garden or apiary.
- 14. (a) The Show organisers reserve the right to refuse any entry without assigning reason for doing so.
 - (b)The Show organisers reserve the right to inspect gardens from which exhibits have been entered for competition in order to be satisfied that the conditions governing competitive exhibits are fulfilled.

- 15. All exhibits except where otherwise stated, must be staged in the vases and dishes provided by the Show organisers. Exhibitors must provide their own boxes, boards, baskets and pedestals.
- 16. All exhibits should be correctly named on the name cards provided. Errors in naming will not disqualify, but the Judges will regard correctness and clearness in naming as telling in favour of an exhibit in close competition. If the name of the variety is unknown, the label should bear the words 'Name Unknown'.
- 17. Pots must be clean.

JUDGING

- 18. The decision of the Judges shall be final as to merit. Any other points of dispute shall be referred to the organisers for decision which shall be final and binding on all parties. Protests on points of classification or violation of the rules shall be made in writing to the Show Manager not later than 4pm on the day on which judging takes place. Protests shall be accompanied by a fee of £5 which shall be refunded if the protest is sustained.
- 19. Judging Times, Saturday 13 September:

Honey 10.15am
All other exhibits 10.45am
The Craig Wallace Award 2.30pm

No person except the Judges, Manager, Stewards or persons officially appointed, will be allowed to remain in the Exhibition area during the time of judging. No person may act as a Steward of a Section if she or he is exhibiting in that Section.

20. After being judged, exhibitors must not re-arrange their exhibits in any way.

PRIZES

- 21. One First, one Second and one Third prize will ordinarily be awarded in any class. An exhibitor may be awarded more than one prize in any class except where otherwise stated. On the recommendation of the Judge, additional commendations may be awarded in classes where the standard is high. Any prize may be withheld or modified if the exhibits are considered unworthy of the prize offered.
- 22. Cup or trophy classes for the highest number of points in the event of a tie, the cup or trophy will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the greatest number of first prizes.

- 23. Successful exhibitors should claim their Prize Money from the Show Manager's desk between 1.30pm 5.30pm on Sunday 14 September. Exhibitors who are unable to collect their prize money can nominate an exhibitor to collect it on their behalf on Sunday. Money not claimed on Sunday between 1.30pm-5.30pm will be deemed to have been forfeited.
- 24. All Cups and Trophies awarded to winners in the various classes to be retained for one year and returned to the Secretaries of the various Societies on or before 1 September of the following year.

REMOVAL

- 25. No person shall remove any exhibit or portion of exhibit until **5.30pm** on Sunday.
 - Exhibitors who remove any exhibit before 5.30pm on Sunday may not be permitted to exhibit at future shows.
- 26. The Show will close at 5.30pm on the second day. From 5.30pm onwards competitors may remove their exhibits from their stands. At 5.30pm all competitors and their assistants will assemble at their exhibits, and these must be removed from the marquee by 6.00pm. Societies will take full responsibility for stewarding their section.

N.I. HONEY SHOW

The N.I. Honey Show will adopt the Rules and Regulations of the City of Belfast Autumn Flower Show, which are printed on pages 5-8 of the Schedule 2023 and in addition the recommendations published in the BBKA's Guide for Judges and Exhibitors of Honey and Bee Produce of March 1993.

HONEY SHOW RULES

- 1. All honey and beeswax must be the product of the exhibitor's own apiary, with the exception of Class 31.
- 2. All extracted honey must be exhibited in standard, clear glass squat or deep 454gm (1lb) honey jars with secure, easily removable covers, to the satisfaction of the Judge.
- 3. All honey exhibits will not be sold, unless requested by the exhibitor.
- 4. All exhibits must be unlabelled, except Class 9.
- Honey colour British Standards Institutions (No. 1656) filters (Glasses) will be used.
- 6. Mead must be in colourless, clear glass, round shouldered, punted full sized wine bottles with flanged stoppers, filled to allow a 6mm to 9mm (1/4in. to 3/4in.) air space.
- 7. Mead must be made by exhibitor, not fortified in any manner, and with no added fruit or flavouring, except class 19.
- 8. Children, young persons under 18 years or their eco-schools or other youth clubs/groups may enter Classes 1-29 with the exception of 17, 18 & 19 subject to the rules above. There is no entry fee for such in all classes including Class 31.

Health and Safety - exhibitors preparing wax or any other exhibits or ingredients by heating, baking or boiling should do so with access to first aid equipment and foam or powder fire extinguishers. The heating of wax should under no circumstances take place where there is the possibility of wax vapour coming into contact with a spark or naked flame. Cold water should never be allowed to come in contact with hot wax.

- Class 13 Collection of bee products, consisting of three or more of the following: two sections, two jars light honey, two jars medium honey, two jars dark honey, two jars chunk honey, two jars granulated honey, two jars creamed/soft set honey, two 8oz boxes of cut comb, one cake beeswax not less than 8oz weight. Four blocks of beeswax (each between 25g and 30g), one bottle of mead, one candle. A space approx. 3ft deep by 4ft wide (914mm x 1219mm) will be available. Exhibitors may make use of anything they consider will add to the display.
- Class 14 Polish or Furniture Cream in any size of tin or jar.
- Class 15 One moulded candle made from pure beeswax by the exhibitor.
- Class 16 One candle, other than moulded, made from pure beeswax by exhibitor.
- Class 17 One bottle of dry mead.
- Class 18 One bottle of sweet mead.
- Class 19 One bottle of flavoured mead.
- Class 20 Public Interest/Education about beekeeping. Any interesting or instructive Exhibit related to bees or beekeeping not including live bees. The display area that is required must not exceed 600mm x 600mm (2ft x 2ft) for bench display.
- Class 21 A decorative or artistic exhibit relating to bees or beekeeping. Dimensions must be stated on entry form. The required display area must not exceed 600mm x 600mm (2ft x 2ft). Brief description of exhibit is permitted
- Class 22 Confectionery. Honey sweets and/or honey chocolates displayed in a box with a transparent lid or covering (at least 8 sweets/chocolates, all the same, all the same type, and no more than 12).
- Class 23 Biscuits. In an airtight tin/box. Six biscuits, which taste of honey
- Class 24 THE U.B.K.A. PRESIDENT'S SHIELD. Honey Fruit Cake. Ingredients: 225g/8oz self-raising flour, 175g/6oz sultanas, 175g/6oz honey, 110g/4oz butter, 2 medium eggs, pinch of salt.

<u>Preparation</u>: Cream butter and honey together well. Beat eggs and add alternately with sifted flour and salt (save a little flour to add with sultanas). Beat mixture well and lightly. A little milk may be added if necessary, fold in sultanas and stir well and pour into a prepared 180mm/7in. round tin. Bake in pre-heated oven 180C/350F/Gas Mark 4 for approximately 1½ hours.

Class 25 Honey Fruit Loaf. Exhibits must be made from the following recipe:

Ingredients: 150g/5oz self-raising flower, 1/2 level tsp ground cinnamon, 60g/2oz caster sugar, 90g/3oz sultanas, 75g/2½ oz clear honey, 30g/1oz butter or margarine, 1 tbsp milk, 1 egg.

<u>Method:</u> Sieve flour with cinnamon. Add sugar and fruit. Melt butter or margarine with honey over low heat and stir into dry ingredients with beaten egg and milk. Mix well and pour into greased and lined 500g/1lb loaf tin. Bake at 150°C/300°F/Gas mark 2 for about 1 hour.

Exhibits are welcome from primary school eco-clubs. Displays are limited to one per school 900mm x 900mm x 900mm (3ft x 3ft x 3ft). The entries can be either about bumblebees or honeybees with regard to any one or combination of the following: biology of the bee, behaviour of the bee, housing of the bee, habitat and forage of the bee, the benefit of these insects to our environment regarding plant life and food supply for birds, animals and humans. The decision of the Judge will be final.

ALLOTMENT CLASS

Open to any Allotment Association or Allotment Society. Large Societies or Associations may subdivide their total number of allotments into two or more groups and make an entry for each group. An association or society wishing to enter more than one collection must ensure that the produce of any plot holder is shown in only one entry.

Note that for vegetables and fruit the maximum points available can be restricted by the kind or type shown. E.g. Medium tomatoes 18, beefsteak types 15, cherry types 12. Dessert apples 20 points but cooking apples 18. Details are in the relevant Handbook/Judges guide.

- 2. Only fresh, home-grown flowers can be used in the vase.
- 3. The display will be judged out of a total of 35 points, split into: 25 points for the colour, form, condition, quality and freshness of the flowers on display, and 10 marks for the overall presentation and effect of the flowers in the vase. The vase will be viewed from all directions. Judging of the flowers should be to the normal rules used for other classes.
- 4. Stems used in the display must be showing flowers only. No seed heads or berries will be allowed.
- 5. No accessories whatsoever such as bows and additional foliage will be allowed. Foliage which is growing naturally from the flowering stem and still attached to that stem is allowed.

NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

- Flowering stems can be taken from ANY flowering plant.
- The different kinds of plants need to be taken from different genera.
 For instance, pinks, carnations and sweet William, which are all dianthus, would not be classed as different kinds.
- This class is open for anyone to enter and Judges should use their discretion when judging the class.
